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Advancing NFU Climate and Emissions-Reduction Policies

Eight Ways That You Can Help Grow Our Work

Unless we implement local, regional, national, and global measures to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, we risk devastating temperature increases: 3 to 6 degrees Celsius across Canada this century. To prevent this, we must slash emissions, in Canada and around the world, now, and in all sectors: energy production, manufacturing, transport, housing, and farming.

Emission reductions are coming.

The federal government has committed to reduce emissions by 30% by 2030 and make Canada carbon neutral by 2050. Because farms emit significant quantities of GHGs—about 11% of Canada's total—farms are going to experience big changes. **To ensure that farmers' interests are protected, we need to lead those changes**. Most important, as we work to make our food systems climate compatible, we must also advance toward our other goals: higher net farm incomes, revitalized communities, more young farmers, increased sustainability, justice and equity, and democratic control.

The following outlines eight ways you can help the NFU advance its policy solutions to reduce agricultural emissions while raising farm incomes and building sustainability.

Farmers have a lot to lose. Farmers want to contribute solutions. Farmers need to lead.

NFU officials and staff will do all we can, but **it's important that NFU members and associate members also take action.** We need broad-based, intensifying policy advocacy for systems change. We need your help. Here are eight ways you can contribute to advancing farmer-supporting policy solutions:

- 1. Learn all you can on these issues. The NFU has published analyses of climate change risks and emissions solutions. Please see the reports and fact sheets listed and linked above. Keep up to date at www.nfu.ca
- 2. Use NFU material and other sources to create public content: social media posts, letters to the editor, op-eds, or presentations to local groups. Let people know that climate change is a huge threat, farms are vulnerable, solutions exist, and that farmers want to help and lead. If you are not confident in creating content yourself, please share NFU social media and publications. You can find tips on how to write an op-ed in the <u>Union Farmer</u>, <u>Summer</u> 2020 edition.
- 3. Help educate and activate your MP or MLA/MPP. Make an appointment to meet in person or via a conferencing app (maybe include fellow NFU members) or write a letter or email. Let your MP or MLA/MPP know that farmers support policies to reduce emissions from the food system and all other economic sectors. Make regular contact, share credible content, and become a trusted source of information.
- 4. Intervene at the local municipal level. Support local food policy initiatives, ask about government food procurement, support community gardens, and help build local and regional food systems.

- 5. Work with others in the NFU. Join the NFU Climate Committee (email nfu@nfu.ca); work with NFU Board members in your Region; attend regional and national conventions; and organize meetings on climate change and emissions reduction in your Local or Region—National Office can provide speakers (in-person or via the internet).
- Talk to friends, family, and neighbours. One-on-one conversations are important. Share NFU analysis and publications. Organize small-group or town-hall meetings—the NFU can provide speakers. Ask others to become involved and sign them up as NFU members or associate members.
- 7. Build the movement. We need to use the classic formula: organize, educate, agitate. A strong movement is built on trust, shared understanding, personal contact, and collective action. Build connections and alliances. We must create a broad-based movement that works to refocus agricultural policies, transform energy and food systems, and move our society toward long-term sustainability. This requires a strong, effective grassroots movement and widespread democratic participation.
